ABOUT CMCB CORPORATION – ROLES & RESPONSIBILITIES

Members of the CMCB Board of Directors, often are members of the Corporation first, but this is not a requirement. Once joining the board, all board members are expected to meet the following responsibilities:

- **Serve one three-year term, voted in by the Corporation members at the Annual Meeting in September.** Corporation members do not have term limits.
- **Attend the Annual Meeting in late September.**
- **Participate on at least one committee.** These current committees include: *Corporation, Nominating, Financial, Audit, Events, Development, Programming, and Human Resources as well as additional ad hoc committees.*
- **Participate in the annual luncheon** (purchase a minimum of two tickets above and beyond the give/get expectation) and at least one other fundraising event.
- **Contribute to the annual fund to the best of their capacity, or the corporation minimum giving requirement to the annual fund, whichever is higher.** There is also a give/get option for the financial contribution. Appendix - Key Definitions

On November 12, 2020 the Community Music Center of Boston held its first Community Conversation of the 2020-21 year: *Interrogating Musical "Quality," Can culturally responsive music education lead to excellence?*

This Community Conversation was hosted on Zoom by CMCB Executive Director Lecolion Washington, serving as both presenter and moderator of the event. About 100 attendees, including members of the CMCB community and members of the wider national arts and education community, attended the event.

Culturally inclusive

Creating and expanding spaces that equitably recognize the customs, arts, social institutions, and achievements of various nations, people and other social groups. Rather than asking "who is being included?" culturally inclusive practices ask "who is being excluded?"

Culturally inclusive spaces seek to *equitably* include those who are being excluded in a deep, meaningful way that is not tokenistic. Equity is armor against tokenism.

Learner centered

A learner-centered approach requires a teacher to see their student through an asset-based lens and acknowledge what they can learn from their student, not just how their students can learn from them. Applying a learner-centered approach also requires a teacher to be culturally inclusive.
